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# **WORKFORCE INNOVATION & OPPORTUNITY ACT**

President Obama signed the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act into law on July 22, 2014. "The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) is a bipartisan law that has one simple goal: connecting more Americans to good jobs. Because better skills lead to better wages, training is needed for modern jobs. WIOA provides quality infrastructure and investment in America's greatest asset, its people". WIOA recognizes there is no panacea for improving the American workforce; the program tailors paths for youth, veterans, adults, and those with barriers to employment.

The law provides state and local areas the flexibility needed to collaborate across systems in an effort to better address the needs of employers and employees alike. This new alignment of services across systems, such as workforce development, economic development, and vocational and higher education, allows localities to tailor the delivery of services in order to serve clients in the most effective and efficient manner possible. Our nation's economy has experienced a great deal of change since the Workforce Investment Act was enacted in 1998. Following the recession, nearly every business in the United States made changes to adapt to the economic uncertainty that rippled through the nation. WIOA addresses the need for increased involvement of the business sector, mandating at least 51% of the Local Workforce Development Board be represented by private industry, including the Board Chair.

"Performance Accountability" was another major WIOA change; in the program WIOA is designed to reflect that securing a job for a client is not good enough, retention of the job is just as important. Under WIOA, employment retention is measured in the fourth quarter, ensuring those who obtain a job by visiting one of America's Job Centers, maintain employment over time. Continued education and credential obtainment are also measured under WIOA. While there are many other performance and compliance measures within WIOA, they serve to ensure a simple goal is met: connect more Americans with good jobs. The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area recognizes the importance of these changes and plans to leverage said changes to provide innovative solutions for Central Arkansas' workforce and employers.



# INTRODUCTION

The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board (CAWDB) is charged with the implementation of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) throughout the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area's six county service area of Pulaski, Faulkner, Saline, Lonoke, Monroe and Prairie Counties.

The CAWDB is determined to provide both job seekers and employers with the best training/education options designed for the best jobs available throughout the area. To accomplish that goal, the proper analysis of the demographics, job opportunities and availability of the training/education necessary to qualify for those jobs must serve as the foundation for CAWDB's policy decisions. In other words, the CAWDB needed "LEVERAGE" to accomplish their stated goals.

The very definition encapsulates the CAWDB's stated goal to use the data analysis and conclusions drawn from LEVERAGE as a catalytic first step to meet the labor force needs of business and industry and provide every advantage for participants to obtain a higher standard of living throughout the six county service area.

The goal of this report is to provide a base line of information which can be used for policy decision making by the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board. The first objective is to align training programs to the needs of industry for the benefit for both the jobseeker and employers. Targeted training opportunities will provide participants with the increased probability of obtaining a good paying job. The increased labor pipeline will provide businesses with the workforce they need to operate and grow their companies throughout the region.

The second objective of this report is to build the case for limiting training dollars to only those training/educational programs which are applicable in the eight industry sectors identified as "in-demand" through this analysis.

The eight industry sectors which are identified as "in demand industries" through this analysis are: Manufacturing, Construction, Education and Health Services, Finance and Insurance, Trade and Transportation, Accommodation and Food Services, and Other Services. Matching the right job skills for the most available jobs will prove to be the "innovation" and will generate the "opportunities" in the CAWDB's policy decisions for implementation of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act.

Lastly, the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area wants to commend the Board of Directors for their vision, commitment, and guidance during this process and moving forward.

# **CALL TO ACTION**

In the past, a large pool of unskilled labor was an attractant for business location decisions. During that time, industries also made their location decisions based on the presence of raw materials. The skills sets needed to produce these products were minimal, so an educated workforce was not an important factor for location decisions.

It goes without saying, the global economy has changed since the time of the industrial revolution, as have the needs of business and industry. The presence of an unskilled labor force today, removes a community from a site selectors list almost instantly. Today, businesses rely on a skilled labor force to serve as the lifeblood of their operations. The technological revolution of the past thirty years has changed the means by which businesses operate. These identified advancements in workplace processes, whether it be advanced manufacturing practices or computer programming, require an educated workforce who possess the skill sets which are needed by industry in the region.

The International Economic Development Council's EDRP publication Shifting Workforce Development into High Gear states: "To date, Federal workforce development policy has focused mainly on supply-side strategies, rather than demand-side approaches. Supply-side approaches develop human capital in order to provide the labor market with a steady stream of skilled individuals, but do not take industry's demand for workers into account. This imbalance has created a pool of workers who have been trained, yet do not possess the skills employers seek." The imbalance, referenced by Elizabeth Jacobs above, is currently ongoing throughout the United States and in Central Arkansas. However, the scales can be changed through data-driven decision making, the involvement of the private sector, and the alignment of job placement and creation activities. A chasm between the business community and government supported workforce development is currently becoming an every growing reality. There is much to gain by working together to align workforce development with the needs of industries in the region. How this division came into existence is understandable. Workforce Development Areas (WDBs), along with educational institutions, view workforce development as the development and ultimate security (employment) of the individual. Businesses, on the other hand, directs its focus on the needs of their specific company to operate and expand. By aligning their training programs with the needs of industry, the Workforce Development Areas, their participants and the private sector can benefit greatly. By accomplishing this goal, the Workforce Development Area increases the probability of employment for their participants, increases performance in regards to wages and employment retention, and becomes a contributing partner in the economic development community.

Economic Development Organizations (EDOs) benefit from a demand-driven talent pipeline in marketing and attraction since it is a competitive advantage that cannot be duplicated easily. EDOs also benefit in the retention and expansion of companies. The continued pipeline of workforce, who possess the occupational skills needed by employers, allows industries to expand much easier.

The participant who visits one of the five Central Arkansas Workforce Centers has the most to gain by this new alignment. Regardless of the training program the participant chooses, they will fall within one of the eight major industry clusters outlined later in this document. This placement increases the probability of securing employment within their region at a much higher wage, leading to the enhancement to their quality of life.

**LEVERAGE** was written as the first step in the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area's journey to close the gap between workforce and economic development and toward the tailoring of training programs to explicitly meet the needs of industry throughout the six county service area.

**LEVERAGE** is by no means a panacea to resolving the issue which is currently before economic and workforce development organizations. Rather, it aims to take the important first step toward the alignment of training programs and the needs of industry in Central Arkansas.

# **ECONOMIC BASE**

#### **OVERVIEW**

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act is designed to require the Local Workforce Development Board to determine where the best jobs are available, what skills sets are needed for those jobs and which training/education will best prepare individuals for those jobs. The first crucial step to identify those jobs, the skills needed and how best to obtain those skills is to gain an understanding of the "economic base" of the area to be served. An economic base analysis is defined by the International Economic Development Council as "a comprehensive study of a locality's economy, focusing on the importance of exports." To begin this process requires an understanding of the demographic makeup of Central Arkansas. Our purpose is to complete such a study which shall be utilized by the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board as its foundation for directing WIOA activities throughout the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area.

#### KEY FINDINGS: DEMOGRAPHICS

The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area experienced a population growth of 6.8% from 2010 to 2020. However, such growth has not been uniform across all counties in the area. For example, Saline County experienced a population growth of 15.2% during that time frame, while Monroe County experienced a 16.6% population loss. The decrease in population in Monroe and Prairie County is a red flag worth noting for planning purposes. Moving forward, the approach for workforce development in Faulkner, Lonoke, Pulaski, and Saline Counties will be drastically different than in Monroe and Prairie Counties.

For example, the population decline in Monroe and Prairie County can be attributed to the migration of individuals toward the primary employment cores to their west. This movement of people is a direct result of declining agricultural employment opportunities in those two counties. In contrast, Lonoke County, home to numerous large employers such as Riceland and Remington Arms, has a growing population.

A similar contrast concerning per capita personal income exists among the six counties. While Faulkner County has the second-fastest-growing population, it has lower per capita personal income than Pulaski and Lonoke Counties, which are growing more slowly. However, it must be noted that college students are included in these numbers, and Conway, the Faulkner County seat, houses three four-year collegiate institutions hosting thousands of students who have a limited income. Workforce Development cannot be effectively accomplished through a "one size fits all" approach.

The age range of the primary workforce will be individuals who are 20-64 years old. For the Central Arkansas Workforce Development region, there are 427,015 individuals within that age range, representing 58.6% of the total population. The median age in the region is 37.4 years, while the counties range from a low of 33.6 years in Faulkner County to a high of 46.8 years in Prairie County.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates the size of the labor force to be 348,670, with an unemployment rate of 6.5% in 2020, which equates to 22,578 unemployed persons in the Central Arkansas region. Unemployment is defined as "people who are jobless, actively seeking work, and available to take a job." An essential factor to note is that persons who have given up on finding employment are not calculated into the unemployment rate because they are not included in the labor force numbers. It is pertinent to understand "underemployed" persons are not counted in this unemployment percentage. Although the Arkansas unemployment rate was reaching record level lows before the COVID-19 pandemic, data indicates there is a need and demand for workforce development services throughout the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area and thereby the need to determine the "highest and best" use of the resources available to the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board.



# KEY FINDINGS: EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Educational Attainment is perhaps one of the most indicative points of data when analyzing demographic characteristics. In Arkansas, 23.0% of Arkansans hold a Bachelor's Degree or higher; that attainment rate is 30.6% for the six-county region of the Central Arkansas WDA. This higher educational attainment level in the region is driven by the types of employment and many educational institutions throughout Pulaski, Faulkner, and Saline Counties. While the Lonoke County Bachelor's degree or higher attainment rate is 20.6%, Prairie County and Monroe County are 15.4% and 12.7%, respectively.

On another side of the equation, many "in demand" occupations, which will be addressed later in this report, do not require a college degree. The attainment rate for earning a High School Diploma or GED and some college with no degree is 56.3% throughout the state of Arkansas. The Central Arkansas WDA attainment rate is 51.9%. We can gain further insight into the core locations where these potential employees may reside by analyzing High School Diploma attainment on a county by county basis. Monroe (61.6%) and Prairie (61.2%) Counties have the highest percentage of residents with a High School Diploma or GED and those with some college with no degree that did not complete any higher education.

#### KEY FINDINGS: PERSONAL CURRENT TRANSFER RECEIPTS

Personal current transfer receipts (PCTRs) are defined as "income payments to persons for which no current services are performed, plus net insurance settlements." Current transfer receipts from the government include Social Security benefits, medical benefits, veterans' benefits, and unemployment insurance benefits. Current transfer receipts from businesses include liability payments for personal injury and corporate gifts to nonprofit institutions. For the Central Arkansas WDA, PCTRs represented 21.7% of personal income in 2019. This rate is 1.7% below the state total of 23.4% but 4.8% above the nation at 16.9%. Specifically, in the Central Arkansas WDA, Monroe and Prairie Counties held the highest PCTRs as a percent of personal income with 38.8% and 32.8%, respectively.



## OVERVIEW OF LABOR FORCE

Understanding the characteristics of the Central Arkansas Workforce Area is a crucial component of understanding the economic base of the region. By analyzing labor force trends, commuting patterns, and demographics, one can better understand the region's economy as a whole. Pulaski County serves as the primary employment core for the region, providing the majority of employment for residents in every county in the Central Arkansas Area. However, many job opportunities exist in Saline, Faulkner, and Lonoke County as well. The following pages provide insights into the characteristics of Central Arkansas's greatest asset, our workforce.


#### KEY FINDINGS: LABOR FORCE

The labor force of the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area consisted of 348,670 individuals in 2020. The regional unemployment rate was recorded at 6.5%, or a total of 22,578 individuals. During the past decade, Monroe County recorded the highest unemployment rate across the region, reaching 9.1% in 2011. In recent years, Monroe County's unemployment rate has recovered to 6.7%, where it currently stands. Every county in the region was affected by the recession. Most of the impact was felt in 2011 (as indicated in Figure 2), years after the Great Recession. Most recently, all counties experienced a sharp increase in their unemployment rate in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Pulaski County topped the region at a 7.4% unemployment rate, increasing four percentage points from 2019 to 2020.

# KEY FINDINGS: COUNTY PROFILES

A review of Table 14 provides a profile of the age ranges of the individuals who make up the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Region workforce. Workers age 55 and older comprise 19.7% of the workforce in Faulkner County. In contrast, the workforce age 55 and older comprise 27.0% in Monroe County. The apparent lack of younger workers in this rural county may contribute to the economic decline depicted throughout this report. Moving forward, the distribution of workforce development activities within this county needs to be tailored around serving those who fall in this age group.

## KEY FINDINGS: COMMUTING PATTERNS

The data depicted in Tables 15, 16, and 17 were obtained from the United States Census Bureau's online tool OnTheMap. When combined, the three tables can be used to develop a clear picture of both the commuting patterns and the characteristics of the Central Arkansas workforce by county. Table 15 indicates the distance and direction workers traveled by commuters by the county of residents. Table 16 displays the inflow and outflow of workers that live or work within that county. Table 17 identifies the number of workers and the location of their employment by county of residence.

For example, Faulkner County's "distance and direction" wheel, found in Table 15, shows the majority of the workers who reside within the county travel between 10-50 miles in a southward direction to their place of employment. From this example, it is clear that a large percentage of the workforce that resides within Faulkner County is employed in a different county. The data provided in Table 17 indicates that 22.4% of the Faulkner County workforce travels to Little Rock for employment, which is the reason for the "southern pull" depicted in Table 15.


The pattern observed in Faulkner County is consistent across Central Arkansas WDA except for Pulaski County. The majority of Pulaski County's working residents are employed within the county. As indicated, only 29,712 Pulaski County residents travel outside the county for employment, showing Pulaski County's strength as the employment core of the region.


TABLE 16: INFLOW/OUTFLOW BY COUNTY

# LARGEST IN-DEMAND INDUSTRIES

#### **OVERVIEW**

The economic base of the Central Arkansas WDA is composed of a broad array of industries. There are fourteen in-demand sectors highlighted in Table 18. To be considered an in-demand industry in this analysis, the sector must employ at least 5,000 workers.

# KEY FINDINGS: IN-DEMAND INDUSTRIES

In this analysis, several of the in-demand industries were combined into supersectors, as designated by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The Professional, Scientific and Technical Services industry the Management of Companies and Enterprises industry; and the Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services industry were aggregated into the Professional and Business Services supersector. The Trade and Transportation supersector includes the following industries: Wholesale Trade, Retail Trade, and Transportation and Warehousing.

EMSI, a third-party data provider, has all government-run establishments in the Government sector, including public schools and hospitals. Thus the Education and Health Care, and Social Assistance industries do not give a complete picture of the actual employment. For Tables 19 and 22, the Education and Health Care sectors were combined with the portions of the Government sector related to Education and Hospitals to form the Education and Health Services supersector.

#### OCCUPATIONS BY INDUSTRIES

Each of the eight identified supersectors is listed in Table 19 along with a list of the top occupations that provide job seekers employment opportunities within that industry. While not all-encompassing, the occupations listed are intended to convey the diversity of career opportunities available in the Central Arkansas WDA. These identified occupations also define the career pathways within these industries. For example, one may begin their career in the Health Care industry as a Personal Care Aide and become a Certified Nursing Assistant or Registered Nurse. The next step that will be needed to complete this inventory of occupations is to survey companies to identify the exact location of these jobs. In addition, the development of partnerships with these companies may increase the probability of a participant obtaining employment upon completion of their chosen training path.

#### MANUFACTURING

The Central Arkansas WDA, according to EMSI, is home to 552 manufacturing business locations that develop a wide range of products and employ over 18,000 individuals. For example, there are high concentrations of firms throughout the area in commercial printing, cabinetry, concrete, machine shops, and commercial screen printing. Some specializations exist in the region, such as sanitary paper products, ammunitions, iron and steel pipe and tube, electronic connectors, and unlaminated plastics.

When comparing the area to the national workforce, Location Quotients (LQ) are calculated to show the percentage of local employment as it relates to national employment in a given industry. A location quotient of



1.00 for an industry indicates the share of local employment for a region is equivalent to that of the national level. In contrast, a number greater than 1.00 indicates the concentration of employment in an industry is higher for the region than the nation. A review of Table 20 shows that for the Central Arkansas WDA, Small Arms Ammunition Manufacturing has a 19.91 LQ, and Sanitary Paper Product Manufacturing has a 12.02 LQ. Understanding the concentration of firms and specializations will be crucial in determining the specific training/educational programs available to participants in the Central Arkansas region. This understanding, coupled with the participant's decision of which training program will best meet their needs, enhances the participant's training and the labor force needs of businesses.

# CONSTRUCTION



The average wage for Plumbing, Heating, and Air-Conditioning Contractors is \$59,252, as shown in Table 21. Collectively, there are 15,713 jobs and 1,759 various businesses in the Central Arkansas WDA throughout the construction sector. Given the demand for these jobs, the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area must educate job seekers on the career possibilities within this sector. In the past, vocational training was provided in high schools across the country and careers in technical fields such as carpentry, plumbing, and construction were known for their potential to provide stable careers.

In a time when technology is growing, the demand for these technical fields has not shrunk, despite the reduction of available avenues to receive

such training. The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area recognizes the importance of these jobs, which provide good wages in a much shorter training period when compared to a four-year degree. It's been said "college isn't for everyone" and in fact those that chose vocational paths often have a much easier time obtaining a job at a higher wage than someone who attended a four-year institution.

#### EDUCATION AND HEALTH SERVICES

This supersector includes both the Educational Services, and Health Care and Social Assistance sectors and a subset of the Government sector related to education and health care. The Education and Health Services supersector in the Central Arkansas WDA comprises over 3,721 payrolled businesses that employ 86,964 individuals throughout the region.

The delivery of health care services is one of the most robust sectors in the Central Arkansas region regarding specialization. The robust network of health care institutions serves as a significant asset for Central Arkansas. However, these institutions and the continued growth of this sector depend on a diverse and trained labor force. The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area will focus on training for employment opportunities within the major anchor institutions and the vast network of businesses that support them.



The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area began a focused effort to assist organizations in filling their labor needs for Personal Care Aides and CNAs in early 2016. A review of the IPEDS data for UALR and UCA in Tables 29 and 30 reflects Registered Nurses' perceived oversaturation. Upon initial assessment of the data, the appearance of an oversaturation of Registered Nurses would result in difficulty for program completers to find employment. However, the appearance of oversaturation is due to the numerous Registered Nurse training programs in the region. Central Arkansas draws many prospective Registered Nurses from across the State and Nation to receive training at UALR, UCA, UAMS, and Baptist Health. Upon graduation, many completers drawn from outside the region will not compete for jobs in the Central Arkansas WDA; and, thereby eliminating the perceived oversaturation in the area.

The development of a person into a high-quality employee begins with the foundations they learn during their years attending elementary, middle school, and high school. One could argue that a strong workforce starts with Central Arkansas's teachers and the staff who support the numerous educational institutions across the region.

#### FINANCE AND INSURANCE



The Finance and Insurance sector employs 18,126 individuals across 1,451 business locations in the Central Arkansas WDA. Table 23 shows that the region has a high concentration of Direct Health and Medical Insurance Carriers compared to the nation, with an LQ of 4.65. The Commercial Banking, Insurance Agencies, and Brokerages industry account for almost 64% of the employment in the sector. The top occupations in this sector are insurance sales agents, customer service representatives, and tellers.

#### TRADE AND TRANSPORTATION

This supersector includes the Wholesale Trade, Retail Trade, and Transportation industry sectors. According to EMSI, there are 4,550 business locations in the Trade and Transportation supersector employing 64,012 individuals within the region, making it one of the largest supersectors in the area.

As a result of the shutdowns and disruptions in the supply chain during the COVID-19 pandemic, there has been an increase in demand for the Transportation industry. The Central Arkansas WDA has a competitive advantage in the Transportation sector by having Interstate 30 and Interstate 40 in Little Rock. This direct link to Dallas and Memphis places Central Arkansas as an excellent location for the distribution industry. Truck



driving, as an occupation, provides jobs in the range of \$50,000 per year on average. However, career paths in this sector are not just limited to truck driving. Other occupations exist within various distribution centers.

Over the past several years, the Retail Trade sector has provided employment opportunities for many WIOA participants, such as our youth and the elderly participants, who may have a more difficult time gaining employment. As part of this study, the "establishment employers" which have career ladders and internal education programs must be identified. For example, Enterprise Rental Car is known for its internal management program which produces top managers and executives for the company. All businesses, regardless of sector need top quality supervisors and managers to run day to day operations.

The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area through Eligible Training Providers and internal soft skill/professional training will work towards preparing participants for these leadership roles. With the proper training, a participant, who may have entered into a company as a cashier or stocker, will learn the skills and abilities needed to satisfy the requirements of better paying positions. As with other sectors, the Business Services Team will work to identify the companies that meet the above criterion with which to partner.

#### PROFESSIONAL AND BUSINESS SERVICES



The Professional and Business Services supersector is made up of the following industry sectors: Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services; Management of Companies and Enterprises, and Administrative and Support and Waste Management and Remediation Services. In the Central Arkansas WDA, this supersector has 3,711 business locations that employ 39,273 individuals. The largest occupations listed for the Professional and Business Services are customer service representatives, janitors and cleaners, and security guards, which accounts for approximately 6,000 jobs in 2021, which do not require formal education.

# ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD SERVICES

The Accommodation and Food Services sector employs 27,081 individuals with 1,673 business locations across the Central Arkansas WDA. The overwhelming majority (84%) of these jobs are at restaurants, with the largest occupations of fast food and counter workers, and waiters/waitresses. Many of the jobs in this industry do not require formal education.

# PROGRAM COMPLETIONS & LABOR FORCE GAPS

### IPEDS AND LABOR GAPS

The Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) serves as the primary education data collection program for the National Center for Education Statistics. IPEDS provides values related to program completions, enrollment, program cost, retention, and students' graduation for 2-year and four-year educational institutions. While IPEDS data is not available for every eligible training provider in the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area, it is available for the University of Arkansas - Pulaski Technical College, the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, and the University of Central Arkansas. By comparing IPEDS data to regional job openings derived from EMSI, the labor force gap can be estimated for specific training programs.

The data on the following tables were derived by matching Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) data from IPEDS to individual Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) data from EMSI by using the crosswalk from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES).

This allows a comparison between educational program completions in a given year to the number of regional job openings for each occupation that could employ a person holding that specific academic credential.

For this analysis, the SOC codes for detailed postsecondary teaching occupations were not included because the EMSI category is ambiguous. For example, a person completing a degree in History would not be qualified to fill a job as a Physics Professor, so those job openings should not be included in that educational program.

#### HOW TO USE THE FOLLOWING CHARTS

The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board of Directors has directed all eligible training programs to be focused on jobs identified as in-demand in the region. The directive will benefit both job seekers and employers by targeting the proper training for available and in-demand careers. This focused approach will increase the likelihood of securing a job upon completing the program and providing a workforce pipeline that possesses the skills and knowledge needed.

To determine the jobs and training programs on which to focus on, Tables 28-30 will be used to analyze the applicability of such specific training programs. The following example can be applied to each table to develop the needed determination for each program. For example, for Pulaski Technical College's Truck and Bus Driver/Commercial Vehicle Operator and Instructor program, a labor force gap of 1,120 exists in the region. This labor force gap can be calculated by subtracting the eight regional program completions from the 2020 openings column, which indicates that 1,120 job openings exist for Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers, Light Truck Drivers, and Bus Drivers. These three job titles are combined to make up the job openings and total jobs columns.

### TRAINING FOR REAL JOBS

To effectively adhere to the directive set forth by the Board, many programs will need to be removed from the eligible training provider list. The recommendation of removal does not address the quality of the institution or training program. Rather, the analysis of the type training/education required to qualify for the in-demand jobs determines the course of study that is eligible to be funded. In other words, if a particular job category does not exist in sufficient numbers within the Central Arkansas Region to support graduates of these programs WIOA funding will not be available for that particular course. Furthermore, this defined Board Policy is designed to ensure all training/education funded by the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board helps WIOA scholarship recipients to be equipped with the skills needed to obtain a good paying job to enhance their overall quality of life.

The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board fully agrees with and supports each participant choosing his/her career path. However, this defined Board Policy ensures each participant is provided the "best" options available within the Central Arkansas WDA to prepare themselves for the "best" available jobs. In furtherance of this Board Policy, all eligible training provider/programs are designed to prepare participants for the primary industry sectors in Central Arkansas that have the most opportunity and best paying jobs. In other words, this policy works to mitigate the need for participants to develop a working knowledge and understand the Labor Market Information which is provided to them. This data is complicated and can be confusing and is difficult to both explain and interpret even for those trained in the field. This new approach will provide the participant a much improved chance of securing a quality job upon completion of their chosen training program. Labor Market Information will still be made available to every participant, however the delivery of the information will be packaged in way that is easy to understand and comprehend.

Implementing the new Board Policy outlined above will require existing training/education to be removed from the current "Eligible Training Provider List." For example, the University of Arkansas at Little Rock offers a Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology, a highly sought and popular program at colleges across the nation. However, there are very few applicable jobs available in the Central Arkansas WDA. The estimates show 42 regional openings for jobs requiring Psychology Majors. However, 288 individuals obtained a Psychology Degree from the universities in the region in 2020. This number of graduates equates to an oversaturation within the labor force of 246-degree completions, creating a very competitive job market. Training for this program through the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area would be a disservice to our clients, as they would likely struggle to find employment upon graduation.

Another example that provides insight into the value of this new policy is to review vocational training programs that fall outside of four-year collegiate degrees available through Pulaski Technical College. A review of the Emergency Medical Technology/Technician (EMT Paramedic) training program reveals that it had an average of 41 completions in 2020. However, the job availability data indicates there are only a total of 13 job openings that require this training. This shows an oversaturation of the labor force by 28 completions. In contrast, Pulaski Technical College also houses numerous vocational training programs that can provide participants with a higher probability of securing a new job to produce an increased quality of life. An example of such a program is the Heating, Air Conditioning, Ventilation and Refrigeration Maintenance Technology/Technician program, which only had 27 completions during 2020. However, there are 102 openings within this field in the region.

This is an example of the types of program the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area will support under the new Board Policy. In the back of this document you will find an extensive list of employment opportunities in the in-demand industry sectors.

#### RECOMMENDED TRAINING PROVIDERS

"Leverage" is defined as "to gain greater professional, economic, and political change" and is a direct result of the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board commitment, hard work and forward thinking to the future of the Central Arkansas Workforce WDA. The Board, following a training session which focused on "Sector Strategies" worked to develop a new strategy to energize the workforce development system in Central Arkansas.

The thesis of their new plan document could be summarized as "Provide training for applicable occupations and existing job opportunities, which lead to an increased quality of life for WIOA participants in Central Arkansas". The following is the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Area's recommended training programs that support the seven industry clusters identified in this document. Eligible Training Programs have been organized by the industry sector they support.

This new policy determination was made by the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board of Directors and supported by the Chief Elected Officials of the six counties of Pulaski, Faulkner, Saline, Lonoke, Monroe and Prairie. It is our hope that this list serves as a baseline for further considerations, with the addition and removal of programs as needed. Continued review of the programs on an annual basis will enable the Board to adapt to changes in the labor force needs of businesses. The Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board will work toward the prioritization of WIOA scholarships to educational providers in the region, defaulting to other institutions for specialized training not offered in the region and other unique circumstances.

Also, at the request of the Board, all institutions which are not located in the State of Arkansas have been removed. In the case a training program is needed, which is not available in state, the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board will review each such case on an "as needed" basis.

Lastly, the Central Arkansas Planning and Development District, Inc. wants to commend the Central Arkansas Workforce Development Board of Directors for their engagement, time, and commitment to enhancing the delivery of workforce training in Central Arkansas. Moving forward with the implementation of these decisions, we thank the Board for their continued support and engagement.
